# Definition: Better Software Developer

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  - Career primarily revolves around writing code to solve problems

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- Better:
  - Hard to get metrics for this
  - Not necessarily “Good at Leetcode”
  - Closer to:
    - “Coworkers enjoy working with my code”
    - “Coworkers enjoy working with me”
    - Git blame is not my enemy

## Clarification: “Neovim”

- All the arguments I’m making in this video equally apply to vim - but since this is about my story, I’ll just keep it simple and say “Neovim”.
  - Side Note: Neovim was actually the first editor I ever used outside of stuff like Eclipse in my computer lab at school!

# Yes, But No: Responsiveness

- Better than “C IS FAST!!”
- Latency bothers me
  - ... but does not make me a better or worse developer!

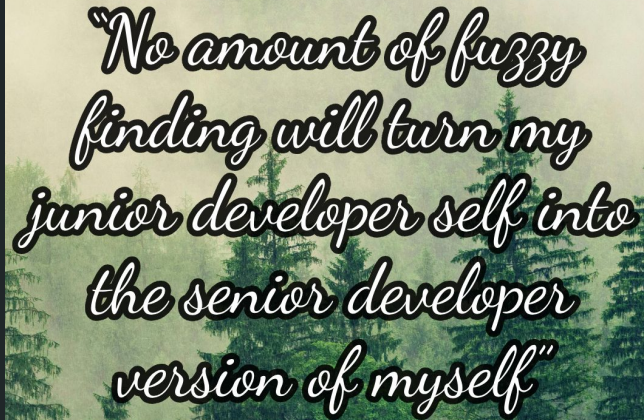

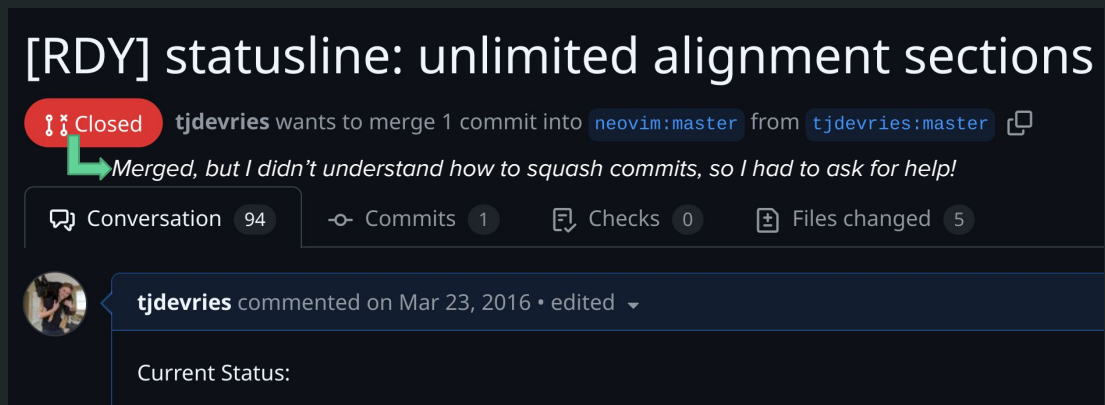

[RDY] statusline: unlimited alignment sections

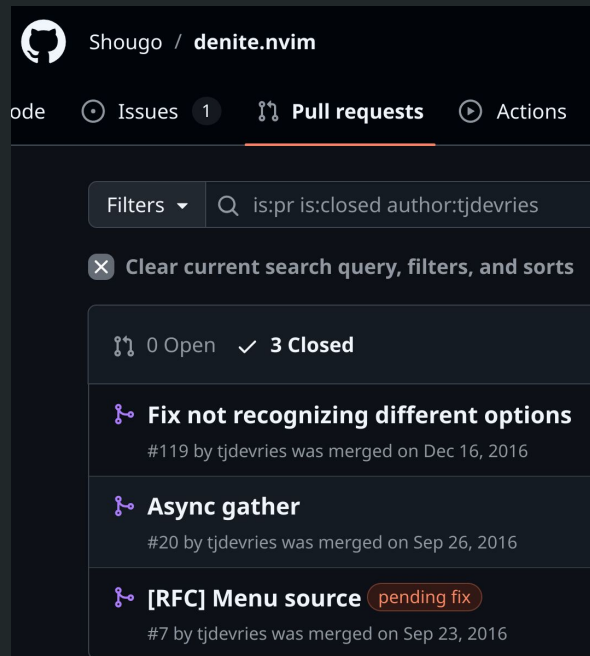
